

Course Abstract: Hybrid/Blended Teaching and Learning

This is an initial description of the *train the trainer* course offered by FH Joanneum as a part of the PRINTEL project. The course will take place on the week 5th November - 9th November 2018 in Graz, Austria. A detailed training program/course syllabus will be available before August 20, 2018.

Introduction

Hybrid/Blended Teaching and Learning is a term continuously more used to describe how e-learning and traditional classrooms methods/independent study are combined, so to create a new methodology. It represents a fundamental change in the way teachers and students approach the learning experience, much greater than just adding computers to the classroom. A framework will be given along with technical infrastructures. The Pedagogical perspectives will be naturally addressed, so that with concrete examples, the learners can work in groups and present their final project work. The idea is to make students more active, increase the quality of learning and their confidence while handling new tools.

In this course we will discuss how to integrate the new methodologies in a course, how to build a course on Moodle, which tools to integrate. Training session will be held about online learning scenarios, **focusing on online project management tools as well as the importance of intercultural awareness on such context.**

Overview of the course

Day 1: Introduction to the course & the role of the teacher in online courses

Morning Session: Overview of the Course Content & Introduction

On the first day we start with an overview of the week and give an introduction to Blended Learning and Teaching. Based on the approach of emergent learning we analyse the background of the trainees. We encourage them to present their experiences and needs. We support them in order to define group projects for the whole week.

Afternoon Session: E-moderating and the reflective practitioner

Gilly Salmon defined E-Moderating as the artistry to support online learning groups in their group dynamics and in their development to a become an autonomous learning group. The online group experiences the five stages access & motivation, online socialisation, information exchange, knowledge construction and development. In small online tasks, so-called e-tivities, the moderator/convener supports the group process and individual learning processes.

In the *reflective practitioner* Schön states that reflection-in-action is the core of practice. In the practice of teaching the reflection about their own work and the exchange about challenges, problems and successes is a key factor for good teaching.

Day 2: The online learning environment and portfolios

Morning Session: Dealing with an e-learning platform

The second day starts with Moodle. Moodle as a learning platform enables the administration of courses and persons, the provision of material, the communication between learners, learners and teachers and the assessment using tests, delivery, peer feedback. At FH JOANNEUM Moodle is the main platform for e-learning. In special workshops – TeDis: technical and pedagogical workshops – the teachers learn how to **use Moodle and the most important tools of Moodle.**

Afternoon Session: Online-Portfolios to support students' reflection processes

E-Portfolios are important to learning, teaching and assessment. Portfolios support the reflection process in students' learning. The creation of E-Portfolios challenges students to develop skills essential for 21st century learning, as organising and planning material, giving and receiving feedback, reflecting, selecting and arranging content. Teachers reflect about the use of e-portfolios for their teaching practice and get to know tools and models for integrating the portfolio into their classes with the inclusion of assessment.

Day 3: Multimedia production

The third day will address online learning scenarios. In online scenarios, learning materials are important but in a different way with respect to face-to-face teaching. A special focus will lie on the interplay between questions to foster students' activities, material in form of texts, pictures, visualization, videos ... and the discussion between students and teachers (in their role as moderators/convener).

Day 4: **Dealing with online project management tools** & assisted group work

*Morning Session: **Introduction to project management***

On the fourth day the participants will get familiar with online management systems both in theory and in practice. FHJ has wide experience in managing a large scale of European Projects. Insight and practice relevance will be given on **how to work with Templates, reporting as well as online project based learning tools such as google drive, survey monkey, etc.**

Afternoon Session: Assisted group work

Supported by three persons from FH JOANNEUM the trainees reflect what they have learned in the session until now. In a structured way they discuss **which aspects they will integrate into their projects.** They decide what is open and/or missing, and declare what additional input they need.
